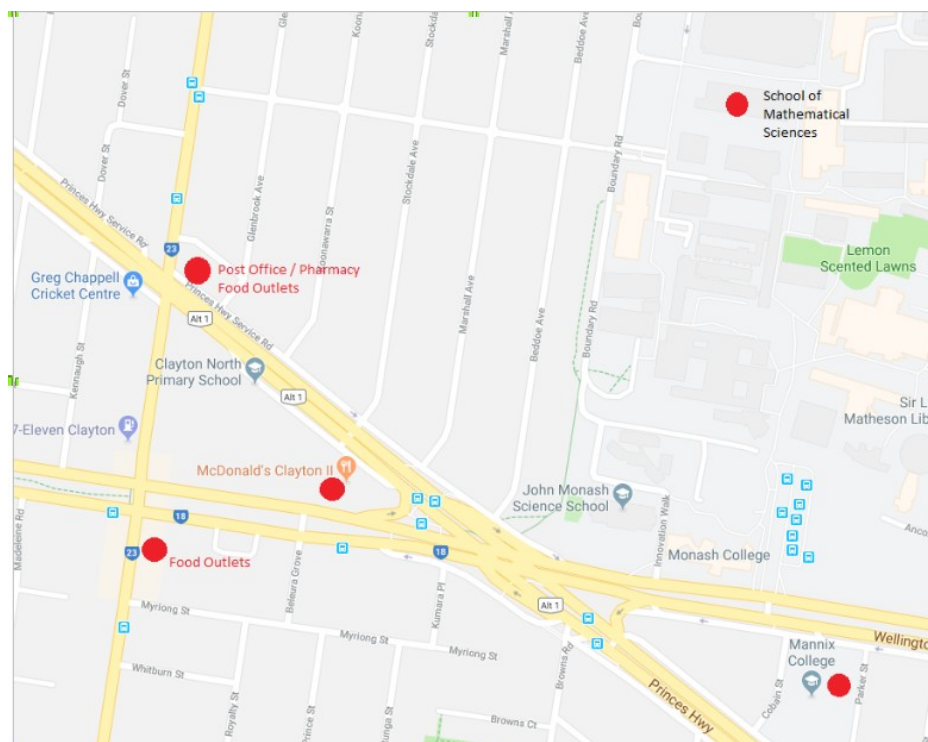

The nearest train station is Huntingdale Station (on the Cranbourne/Pakenham line). The 601, 630 and 900 buses make frequent trips between the station and the Bus Interchange.

Note: to use the public transportation in Melbourne (trains, bus, trams), you first need to buy a "myki" card, and then top it up to pay for your travels. Myki cards can be bought from myki machines, consumer desks in major railway stations, 7-11 stores, some pharmacies, etc. (Please note - myki cards cannot be purchased on buses or trams and must be purchased prior to travelling).
